3.Bring to the table:- to offer something that will be an advantage.


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Eg:- I bring to the table best coding ability in the entire company.

4. Two peas in a pod:- similar





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9. Break fresh/new ground:- to do something that was not done before

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


Eg:- Just by waking up today and being present, you are actively breaking new ground.

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16. Fall into line: - adhere to rules



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20. A mincing walk: small and delicate steps








Eg:- I will never work with Peter again. He expects everyone to do the work on his behalf, once bitten twice shy.




34. Be like chalk and cheese: Be absolutely different




